God always persists and continually finds new ways to invite people into unity with God. The Three Lenten Disciplines: Prayer

Fasting, almsgiving, and prayer are not specifically Christian practices. Jewish piety, from which the primitive church developed, already included these three spiritual exercises. The Muslims also include these three in the five pillars of their Islamic faith. But it is Jesus himself who invites us to practice these three pillars of conversion. He reminds us that they are not done to "show off" that we are holier than everyone else. On the contrary, fasting, charitable works, and praying are done with humility (Matthew 6:1-6; 16-21). It is challenging, but we are not discouraged because the Holy Spirit comes to our aid.

The Lenten discipline of prayer can be thought of in two ways. For Christians, to pray in the first way is to speak like children to God, who loves us as mother, father, sibling, and friend. When speaking to God, we tell God what we have inside us, trusting that our words are the ones that most please God. The second approach to prayer means proclaiming with confidence our fears, problems, joys, and yearnings to God, knowing that God loves and hears us. Praying either way means spending time with God, at times talking, at times silent, but always with the assurance that we are loved. —Friar Gilberto Cavazos-González, OFM, Copyright © J. S. DIOS NOS BUSCA SIEMPRE

Hoy oímos hablar de la implacable búsqueda de Dios hacia nosotros. Nuestras lecturas cuentan historias del intenso deseo de Dios de compartir la vida divina con nosotros. En el Éxodo, vemos cómo Dios muestra una persistencia y una compasión infinitas, incluso con los que refunfuñan contra Dios o parecen haberse olvidado de él. En el Evangelio de Juan oímos cómo Jesús, en su prolongada conversación con la mujer samaritana, la dignifica, nombra verdades incómodas y la conduce gradualmente a un nuevo camino de fe. Podemos confiar en que, al llevar nuestras propias confusiones, miedos y fracasos a Dios, podemos recibir su misericordia y su perdón. Dios siempre persiste y encuentra continuamente nuevas formas de invitar a las personas a la unidad con Dios. Como describe Pablo en Romanos, en la cruz vemos cómo Dios se desvive por demostrar la profundidad y la amplitud del amor divino.

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Las Tres Disciplinas Cuaresmales: La Oración

Yunar, ayudar y orar no son específicamente cristianas. La piedad judía de la que viene la Iglesia primitiva ya practicaba estos tres ejercicios espirituales. Los musulmanes también los incluyen entre los cinco pilares de la fe del Islam. Pero Jesús mismo es quien nos invita a practicar estos tres pilares de la conversión y nos recuerda que no se hacen para ponerse de muestra como si fuésemos más santos que los demás. Al contrario, el ayuno, la caridad y la oración se hacen con humildad (Mateo 6:1-6; 16-21). Es difícil, pero no nos desanimemos porque el Espíritu Santo viene a nuestro alcance; donde somos débiles, Cristo es fuerte. La disciplina cuaresmal de la oración se puede pensar de dos maneras. Para los cristianos, orar de la primera manera es hablar como hijos y hijas a Dios que nos ama como madre, padre, hermano y amigo. Hablando con Dios le recitamos lo que traemos por dentro confiando que nuestras palabras son las que más le agradan a Dios. El segundo enfoque de la oración significa proclamar con confianza nuestros temores, nuestros problemas, nuestros gozos y nuestros anhelos sabiendo que él nos ama y nos escucha. Orar de cualquier manera es pasar tiempo con Dios, a veces platicando, y a veces calladitos, pero siempre con la seguridad que somos amados.
